

## SAMPLE QUESTIONS FOR RAPID FIRE SESSION WITH ROHIT

One of the most popular add-ons to Rohit's keynote is the "Rapid Fire Session"—a moderated Q&A session from the stage where the audience (or event organizers) can ask Rohit anything about his work, research, books or anything in between.

- Name a book that opened your eyes to the invisible and share why.
- Share a time when the future caught you totally off guard.
- What was your first job and what did it teach you?
- Do you have a moment when acting quickly completely changed your path?
- What word should we all stop using when talking about the future?
- What is something non-obvious you learned by traveling or living overseas?
- Is there a trend that you believe in which turned out wrong?
- When it comes to fast action – do you lean more on intuition or data?
- What trend excites you the most right now?
- What non-obvious lessons have you learned by being a parent?
- What does being responsible for the future mean to you?
- What uncomfortable question should leaders be asking more right now?
- What is your best idea that came to you in the most unexpected place?
- What advice would you give to a young person starting their career right now?
- What's a belief you held in the past that you've changed your mind about—and why?
- What's something you misunderstood for a long time that now feels obvious to you?
- What's a tiny moment or decision that had an outsized impact on your life or career?
- Reveals the power of overlooked or serendipitous choices.
- What do most people assume about futurists that is totally off base?
- What non-obvious skill do you use every day that no one taught you—but should have?
- What's a lesson you learned from someone younger than you?
- What's something you've intentionally unlearned—and how did that shape your thinking?
- What question do you wish people would ask you more often?
